To answer this question, you need to consider two aspects of your hand:
high cards and distribution

## COUNTING POINTS

Count the high card points (HCP) in your hand using the following table:

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \text { Ace }=4 \\
& \text { King }=3 \\
& \text { Queen }=2 \\
& \text { Jack }=1
\end{aligned}
$$

A shortcut: 'The Royal Family'

$$
A+K+Q+J=10
$$

There are two ways to count your distributional points; both work, so don't worry which one you use, or even if you use one and your partner uses the other:

## Method 1: count long suits

1 point for the fifth card in a suit
1 more point for any card after the fifth

## Method 2: count short suits

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \text { Void }=3 \\
& \text { Singleton }=2 \\
& \text { Doubleton }=1
\end{aligned}
$$

Do not count short suit points for unprotected honors, which can be 'eaten up' by higher honors. So count no distributional points for

## Singleton K

Doubleton or singleton $Q$
Tripleton, doubleton or singleton J
Add your HCP to your distributional points to get the total points.

Here are some examples of how counting your total points works:

| A A KJ 86 | $\mathrm{HCP}=14$ |
| :---: | :---: |
| - 108 | Dist. $=1$ |
| - 442 | Total $=15$ |
| \& 64 |  |
| A A K 8 | $\mathrm{HCP}=12$ |
| *AJ97543 | Dist. $=3$ |
| -42 | Total $=15$ |
| \% 6 |  |
| A A J 8 | $\mathrm{HCP}=13$ |
| $\bullet 2$ | Dist. $=2$ |
| - K 4 | Total $=15$ |
| \& J 109753 |  |

Distributional points are only useful if you are going to play a trump contract, when your short suits may enable you to score some tricks by ruffing. If you are going to play in notrump, count only HCP; if you are considering a trump contract, use total points to value your hand.

## WHY YOUR POINT COUNT CAN CHANGE

As the bidding progresses, you need to revalue your hand. The following rules can be used:

- If you have four or more cards in a suit partner has bid, you will likely be the dummy. Start fresh, and this time count dummy points as follows:

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \text { void }=5 \\
& \text { singleton }=3
\end{aligned}
$$

$$
\text { doubleton }=1
$$

Add these to your HCP.

On this hand, if partner opens the bidding 1 A , you can add 3 dummy points to your 8 HCP for a total of 11 .
