## HOW TO PLAY IT HOW TO PLAY AGAINST IT

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#### THE ACBL DEFENSES TO MULTI

In North America, the American Contract Bridge League has designated two basic defences to the Multi, and these are available at the table. We have a preference for the more complex Option Two, as it retains 2♥ and 2♠ as natural bids.

#### Option One

dbl Takeout of spades. Respond as you would to a double of a weak two-bid, including Lebensohl, if used.

**2** Takeout of hearts. Respond as to a double of a weak two-bid, including Lebensohl, if used.

Light takeout of the suit doubled. Pass, then dbl

> Natural, limited. A response in the other major is a 2♠/3♥ cuebid, jumps natural.

2NT 16-18. Respond as to a 2NT opening.

3m Natural.

Strong and natural, 47 response is a cuebid. 3♠

4m 5+/5+ in the suit bid and a major. Bidding 4♦ over 4♣ asks for the major; bidding 4♥ over 4♦ says pass if you have hearts or correct to spades.



Bid as over a weak 2 opening. It's quite rare to see an auction where responder is able to pass 2, but as a defender you have to be ready for it. Here is a high-level example from the final of the 2005 Bermuda Bowl between Italy and the USA:

Because Meckwell play a weak-only version of the Multi, South was able to pass the opening bid. That gave West a problem, as his partner might have passed with some strong hands, so he felt he had to balance. East could not be sure how much of his hand his partner had already bid so he naturally took a shot at 3NT, and that drifted two down when South led a diamond.

#### Option Two Immediately over 2.

Note: with a takeout double of a major, pass planning to double on the next round; with a strong hand, double directly since 2 may be passed.
