

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

Jacoby 2NT

Jacoby 2NT is a bid made by Responder after Opener bids 1♥ or 1♠ and right hand opponent passes. A jump to 2NT by Responder promises four or more cards in opener's suit, game forcing values, and asks Opener to further describe their hand. Typically this is a balanced forcing raise, though you will occasionally have an unbalanced hand.

Examples of a typical hand that Responder might hold to make a Jacoby 2NT bid after a 1♥ opening bid:

- 1) ♠Q32 ♥AQ72 ♦AQ65 ♣93 14 HCPs, four hearts and a balanced hand.
- 2) ♠AK2 ♥9872 ◆J7653 ♣A

 12 HCPs, four hearts and an unbalanced hand whose long suit is weak and whose singleton is an Ace. (*Remember, a Splinter Bid, will never be a singleton Ace or King.*)
- 3) ♠AK2 ♥AQ872 ♦A5 ♣J53
 18 HCPs, five hearts and a balanced hand.

Examples of a typical hand that Responder might hold to make a Jacoby 2NT bid after a 1♠ opening bid:

- 4) ♠KQ32 ▼AQ72 ◆AQ65 ♣3

 17 HCPs, four spades and an unbalanced hand with a singleton that is too strong to make a Splinter Bid. (Remember, a Splinter Bid, as a response to an opening bid, shows 10-13 HCPs.)
- 5) ♠AJ72 ♥A72 ♦1065 ♣AJ8

 14 HCPs, four spades and a balanced hand.
- 6) ♠AJ72 ♥A2 ◆109865 ♣A7
 13 HCPs, four spades and a unbalanced hand whose long suit is weak.

After Responder bids Jacoby 2NT, Opener has a series of bids which he considers. The order of this series of bids is determined by the information that bridge theorists have determined will be the most valuable for the partnership.

 Opener's first obligation is to show a second suit. It must be a good five card suit. A good suit would be a suit that contains at least one of the two top honors. Opener would signify this by jumping to the four- level in their second suit.

- Opener's second obligation is to show shortness. With a singleton or a void in another suit, Opener would bid three of the suit in which they have shortness (the singleton will not be an ace or king).
- Opener's third obligation is to show the strength of their hand. If Opener has no second suit and no shortness, they will show the strength of their hand. (The point ranges below are a guideline. Opener is allowed to use his judgment as to the value of his hand).
 - 3♥ or 3♠ Shows a very good hand (~17+ points or the equivalent in length or shape), no shortness and slam interest.
 - O 3NT Shows no shortness and a hand interested in slam if partner has extra values (~14-16 points or the equivalent in length or shape).
 - o 4♥ or 4♠ Shows a minimum hand with no shortness and no interest in slam (~11-13/14 points).

This third obligation is the most common rebid and the most valuable portion of this convention. The skill to evaluate how "good" your hand is acquired through experience... through trial and error. Let's look at a few hands and see how you do. The following hands all assume a 1♠ opening bid and a 2NT response.

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Jacoby 2NT

Bridge students quickly discover that 'basic' bidding' will only get them so far. If they really want to improve, it is necessary to master a certain number of bidding conventions, and be prepared both to play them and play against them. This ebooklet covers the Jacoby 2NT convention.
